OUTSTANDING DIETITIAN OF THE YEAR

Carrie Swift, MS, RDN, BC-ADM, CDCES, FADCES



The Washington State Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics is proud to honor Carrie Swift as Washington State's Outstanding Dietitian of the Year (ODY) for 2025. This award is the most prestigious recognition that the Washington State Academy can give. The award honors a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist (RDN) who has demonstrated leadership and who has served as an outstanding role model of professionalism and as a source of inspiration to others in dietetics.

Carrie is proud to be an RDN, and throughout her 37-year career, she has enjoyed sharing her knowledge, experience and passion for our field with future generations.

She has served in many roles throughout her career, including Chief of Nutrition and Food Services at the Walla Walla VA Medical Center. While at Gwinnett Health System she hired and trained many registered dietitians for outpatient nutrition counseling and diabetes educator positions.

She has served on the Scholarship Review Committee for the Blue Mountain Community Foundation in Walla Walla for the past 6 years, as well as volunteering at the Kid's Farm Center during the Walla Walla Fair, teaching kids about agriculture and dairy production through fun, hands-on activities. She has also been actively involved with her Walla Walla P.E.O. Chapter (FT) since September 2005; providing nutrition programs for members, hosting meetings and events, and helping with fundraising projects to provide scholarships, grants, and other educational opportunities for women.

Carrie has been the Lead, State Grass Roots Advocacy for the Washington State Association of Diabetes Care and Education Specialists, sharing action alerts, gathering comments and feedback for legislators, and educated members on policy and legislation that might impact them. Along with the Washington Academy and the WA Department of Health, she has been an active part of updating the rules relating to Certified Dietitians in WA State, and even helped draft new language to reflect current professional practice for RDNs.

She has attended workshops and has met with legislators on Capitol Hill, in Washington D.C., both in person and virtually to promote legislation such as the MNT Act, the DSMT Expansion Act, Treat and Reduce Obesity Act, and the Telehealth Modernization Act.

All through her career, she has always been an outspoken volunteer promoting RDNs to the interdisciplinary team and to the public. She served as a Media Spokesperson for the Association of Diabetes Care and Education Specialists and she has also authored or co-authored book chapters and peer-reviewed articles, such as Idiots Guides: Overcoming Type 2 Diabetes by Penguin Random House publishing.

In her current role at Sacred Heart Medical Center, she is managing all things formula for the Pediatric Clinical Nutrition team, including creating an Infant Formula Powder Recipes document and a Recipes for Concentrating Breastmilk document. The purpose of the annual RYDY award is to recognize the competency and activities of young dietitians in the Academy of Nutrition & Dietetics, while also encouraging continual member participation in Association affairs.

Kendall earned her Master of Science degree in nutrition and exercise physiology through the Coordinated Program in Dietetics at the Washington State University. Kendall has been a pediatric dietitian at Sacred Heart Medical Center and Children's Hospital since February 2021, covering all units; General Pediatrics, Pediatric Oncology, Pediatric Intensive Care Unit, and Neonatal

Intensive Care Unit. She has earned her Board Certification as a Specialist in Pediatric Nutrition (CSP) and is working to also earn a Certified Specialist in Pediatric Critical Care (CSPCC) in the coming years.

Kendall is not only a board member for Beats and Rhythms, a Non-Profit Organization supporting infants, children, and adolescents with congenital heart disease, but she also manages their public relations. OUTSTANDING STUDENT AWARDS

The purpose of the Washington State Academy's Outstanding Student Award is to recognize the emerging leadership and achievement of students in Academy-accredited and approved dietetic education programs. The Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics established this award in 1994 to recognize students who have demonstrated exceptional academic excellence and leadership in their dietetics program.

Outstanding Student in a Coordinated Program in Dietetics Paulina Nuñez Esquivel



The Washington State Academy is proud to honor Paulina Nuñez Esquivel with the Outstanding Dietetics Student in a Coordinated Program in Dietetics Award for 2025.

Paulina is completing her Master of Science Degree from the Coordinated program at the University of Washington. She is a native of Mexico, where she grew up, but has also moved a lot in her life. Her passion and motivation to thrive in the world of Dietetics stems from having lived with Type 1 Diabetes (T1D) for 22 years. Her goal is to become a certified diabetes educator.

When she worked at Steno, a diabetes research institution in Copenhagen, Denmark, Paulina's research focused on patients' experience with devices for diabetes management. Having been a patient there herself, she was able to see diabetes management in another light, which solidified her motivation to bring patient

voices and experiences to the forefront of diabetes care.

To honor her heritage, she wants to work with minority groups who have been underrepresented and may lack access to care. She believes the language barrier between patients and healthcare providers is a significant factor behind health inequities. Being a bilingual provider will be one way he can help bridge that gap, as well as amplify patient voices.

Over the past year, she completed her Masters of Public Health fieldwork, working alongside the Washington State T1D workgroup of the WA Department of Health (DOH). Paulina created a one page handout in both English and Spanish to help shed light to basic health practices and the available resources, which was well received by the large Latinx community in Washington. More recently, she became a co-facilitator for the T1D Teen Connect group, a once monthly support group giving space to 12-19yo living with diabetes. She believes that increasing space for patient and family health education is most important for patients with diabetes and their families. Based on her experience, she believes there is the most opportunity for growth in youth-centered spaces within Spanish-speaking communities. Outstanding Student in a Dietetic Internship Amelia Chestnutt

The Washington State Academy Outstanding Student Award recognizes more than just achievement—it seeks an emerging leader with the potential to make a real difference. This potential shines through in her journey, defined by her commitment to growth and service.

Amelia has truly demonstrated her passion and commitment; she is consistently working to grow her knowledge and practice skills in all settings, from clinical care to research.

Amelia completed her Master of Science in Nutrition from Central Washington University in the summer of 2024 graduating with a GPA of 3.976. She conducted an important and well-run research study on the topic of "Facilitators and Barriers to Breastfeeding Among Mothers Recovering from Opioid Use Disorder". In her study, she led focus groups in rural WA state to learn more around the perceived obstacles related to breast feeding amongst mothers recovering from opioid use disorder. This research shows her commitment to maternal, pediatric and public health. Her dual bachelor's degrees in Nutrition and Dietetics and French and Francophone studies, both earned with honors, further showcase her academic excellence and versatility. She is now completing her Dietetic Internship.

Amelia possesses a robust set of qualifications and experiences that make her an exemplary candidate for this award. Her eagerness to advance her knowledge and contribute meaningfully to nutrition and dietetics in a variety of settings is evident in her day-to-day performance as an intern. Her preceptor describes her as having "a rare combination of hard work, professionalism, motivation, resilience and humility".

Amelia has gained valuable professional experience as a Nutrition Technician at Sacred Heart Medical Center. In this role, Amelia improved patient outcomes by preparing over 12,000 infant and pediatric feedings per month in collaboration with a multidisciplinary team. Her ability to ensure accuracy and consistency in such a demanding role speaks volumes about her attention to detail and teamwork.
